£4314	Employment of a P.E. Apprentice	Assistance with preparing/sanitising equipment for lessons increases the actual teaching time available. Active lunchtimes will be facilitated through organised physical activity and after school fitness clubs will run within government guidelines.	Additional curriculum support has enabled targeted skill development, raising standards across the school. Lunchtime activities are now structured, involving those pupils who may otherwise not have involved themselves in physical activity.
£165	Hire of equipment and affiliations	Korfball post hire broadens our curriculum offer. Affiliations to local football and athletic associations provides access to league and cup competitions, cross country races and athletic competitions. It increases the number of pupils able to experience the benefits of representing their school; experiencing and aspiring to excellence; learning to lose and win – increased resilience.	Although competitions were suspended pupils continued to play the game, learning skills to equip them to resume competition when possible.

This is a sport that all children will access at the same entry level and there will be opportunity at a later date to compete with other schools in the federation as all schools have purchased lacrosse equipment	Pupils have enjoyed learning new skills; it has been particularly inclusive as no pupil had prior experience of lacrosse and the skills involved are unique to the game.
£3000	Employment of a specialist teacher	Staff with specialist knowledge can disseminate their knowledge to the apprentice and SCITT student	Staff have more confidence when teaching physical education; SCITT students find this invaluable as they have very limited access to PE specific training as part of their teacher training course.

£16358	Employment of PE Apprentices This provides support to staff teaching physical education and structured activity at lunchtimes. Apprentices have also been trained to run sensory circuits.	Pupils in lessons will have more individual support, accelerating progress; they will have young role models to influence attitudes; behaviours at lunchtimes will be positive and pupils will be more active. Sensory circuits can be run at various times during the day, meeting the needs of more children.
£3200	Pupils will continue to compete in SSP arranged competition; local leagues and, increasingly, in Nebula competitions and festivals as the partnership with the Community Sports Foundation develops. <i>Costs are related to subscriptions; transport; purchase of Nebula trophies; supply costs covering attending staff; hiring of venue and provision of referees/coaches.</i>	We aim to increase the participation of our pupils in regular competition, including cross country. This gives opportunity for competition to a broad range of pupils. It gives access to football, cross country and athletic competition for pupils who would not otherwise be able to compete against other schools.

Raised self-esteem, aspiration, self-awareness, ability to work as part of a team and self-confidence.
