

It is said that "a dog is man's best friend"

Dogs provide companionship, pleasure and often a sense of security for their owners.

Unfortunately many dogs, especially if they are untrained, can cause distress and a nuisance to neighbours.

Responsible dog ownership (fouling)

Complaints

In recent years there has been a steady increase in the number of complaints about dogs made to Broadland District Council.
Some of these complaints include dog fouling and stray dog complaints.



Dog fouling

It is estimated that there are over seven million dogs in this country, and that each day, over 1,000 tonnes of excrement are deposited.

Dog excrement contains a number of things which can make people ill - the best known of which is TOXOCARA CANIS, a roundworm.

If the eggs of this worm are swallowed, a range of symptoms can result, from aches and pains to bronchial conditions. In rare cases, eye sight can be damaged.

The risk to human health is small, you can reduce it further by:

- Worming you dog regularly (consult your local vet).
 - Always clearing up after your dog.
- Good hygiene practice.

Broadland District Council has a legal duty to keep certain areas of land which are under its control clear of dog faeces, for example on pavement and carriageways. The Council made an Order that became effective on 22 April 1999, which could lead to a fine of £1,000. This Order makes it an offence if someone allows a dog under their control to foul a public place and they fail to clear up the mess.

Notices may be put up informing residents of the effects of the Order and the penalty.

Dog waste bins

Broadland District Council, with the help of the parish and town councils, has started a programme of installing dog waste bins.

Locations have been selected, after consulting local residents.



Making a complaint to the Council

You can contact the Environmental Health Section at Broadland District Council:

- If you know the person who is allowing their dog to foul the pavement please call (01603) 430534.
- If you wish to make a complaint about fouled pavements please call (01603) 703216.

Stray dogs

You must keep your dog under control at all times, make sure it wears a collar and identification tag.

In addition you can have your dog electronically tagged, ask for details at your local vet's clinic.

Broadland District Council holds a register of lost dogs (and cats) and also offers a service for the collection of restrained stray dogs, all dogs collected are checked for electronic tagging devices.
