AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS

We offer a range of after school clubs and this is due largely to the commitment and dedication of our teaching staff, as they run these clubs voluntarily. Once your child has joined a club, a register is drawn up. This register is taken at the beginning of each club to ensure all those children who have said they are going to attend are actually there – we do this to safeguard your child. In the past here have been occasions when children have not arrived at the after school club, with no explanation. We then have to begin a search for them to satisfy ourselves that they are safe.

If your child is unable to attend the club that they are a member of, we ask that you write a brief note to the member of staff running the club informing them of the absence. This will ensure that there are no misunderstandings and that we are all aware of where the child should be after school.

If your child decides that they no longer wish to attend any of the after school clubs, once again we ask that a note is given to the member of staff running the club and their name will be taken off the register. Many thanks for your support in this matter.

The week's focus will be the stories from the author of The Jungle Book. We have many exciting things planned to promote reading during this project.


- During Guided Reading Sessions, children will be listening to audio stories from Rudyard Kipling's- Just So Stories (this is will be the focus book).






TALK HOMEWORK & WOW WORDS

Rudyard Kipling was born in Bombay, India, on 30 December 1865. His father was an artist and teacher. In 1870, Kipling was taken back to England to stay with a foster family in Southsea and then to go to boarding school in Devon. In 1882, he returned to India and worked as a journalist, writing poetry and fiction in his spare time. Books such as 'Plain Tales from the Hills' (1888) gained success in England, and in 1889 Kipling went to live in London. His most famous book of all time is The Jungle Book.

Please spend at least 10 minutes talking with your child about the question below:

- Can you name the animals that appear in the story of Jungle Book?
- Can you name their character names?
- Which songs can you remember from the famous Disney film?
- Why do you think The Jungle Book became such a popular story and film?






