

into account the travelling conditions and risk assess whether pupils, parents and staff can travel safely to and from school.








We have an exciting few weeks ahead with lots of activities involving reading and books:





















## **READING PROJECT**

#### The Windrush and Black history





#### Monday 25<sup>th</sup> February – Friday 1<sup>st</sup> March 2019

We have many exciting things planned to promote reading during this project.

During the week each year group will have three focus books: 'The Story of the Windrush' by K.N Chimbiri, 'Coming to England' by Floella Benjamin and 'Young, Gifted and Black' by Jamia Wilson.

We will also have an exciting visit from Michael DeSouza (the creator of the popular Cbeebies show and book 'Rastamouse'). He will be doing a workshop with each year group. Michael will be sharing his experiences of coming to England, reciting rhymes and sharing his new characters.

Also during the week:

 Lessons including Whole Class Guided Reading, Drama, Art and English for example, will use this theme as the focus.

#### Taking part in these Reading Projects have clear outcomes for the children;

- Improved progress in Communication, Language and Literacy
- 2. Positive attitudes to learning
- 3. Raised self-esteem and confidence
- 4. Enthusiasm for reading and books
- 5. Establish book/author preferences

The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development has published research which showed that reading books as a family had the greatest impact on academic performance; this includes improvement in reading achievement, language comprehension, expressive language, interest and attitudes to reading and attentiveness in the classroom. I do hope you will enjoy reading any books you have at home with your children.

A love of reading improves a child's life beyond measure.


