Nebula Christmas ...

The past two years blur in my mind into a reel of fuzzy memories, stresses and constant changes. COVID alert levels and tiers, protests, violence, political animosity, Twitter fights, masks and mandatory COVID Passes required to gain entry to larger domestic venues ... and that's just what's happened or happening in the wider world!

In schools, we have had various risk assessments and compliance codes, daily DfE guidance, often emailed at midnight to be assimilated and implemented the following day, pupils and staff unwell ... Advent and Christmas have been different for our schools again this year from what we had come to expect before the pandemic. I know this has been disappointing for many of you that you have not been able to join us and your children in our schools – we were not able to have massive Carol Services or concerts to which everyone was invited, or crowds in our halls to watch the children's performances.

Masks have once again been introduced to be worn in our communal areas in school and depending on the levels of COVID cases in each of our schools and the advice received from Norfolk Outbreak Management Centre, other measures have had to be put back in place to mitigate risk and to try and stop, or reduce the transmission of the virus.

Not all our schools will have done exactly the same things - they are individual schools after all - and we value their differences.

Our schools may have had to

take different measures to neighbouring schools too. This may be because of the particular building, staffing or specific advice they have received from our public health advisers. All measures have the common goal of keeping children safe and help learning take place.

Once again the message, "Do not be afraid" is pertinent this Christmas. We are living in a time when fear has continued to take hold of the world in the face of the new Covid-19 variant. People are concerned about catching the virus, worried about what comes next and asking when it will end? Will we ever be able to return to life as we knew it before?

Regardless, in each of our schools we have celebrated Christmas with your children with a range of festive activities taking place and each school has shared with you what they can, either with photos, reports, recordings or by streaming events live ... to make Christmas in school as normal as we possibly can. Christmas celebrations in our schools for staff and our children are a time for joy and fun, to revisit the Christmas stories, the Nativity, and it is also a time to reflect about what Christmas is really about...

I'd like to share with you the following quotes which remind me of the real meaning of Christmas;

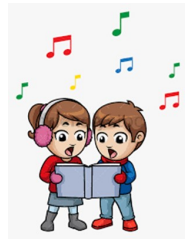

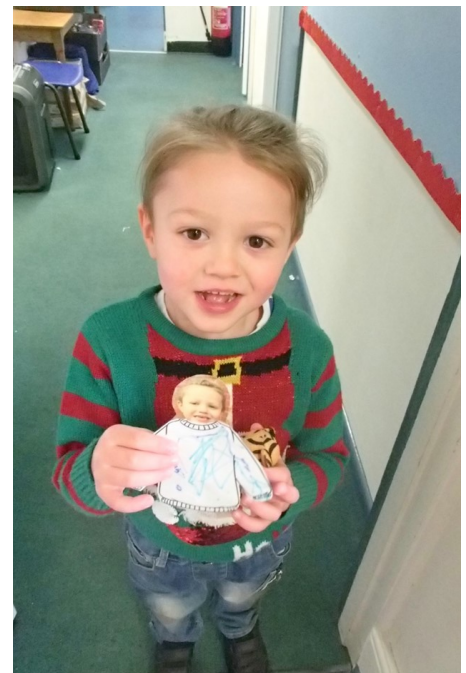

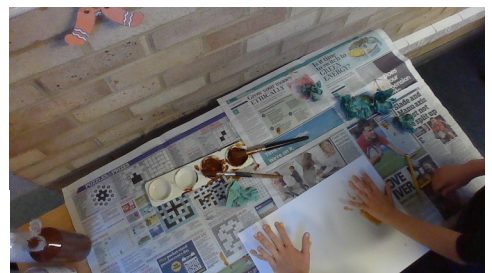
The children in some of our schools have taken part in a Rudolph Run where they donned their antlers and red noses to run, walk or skip a mile to raise money for Nelson's Journey.

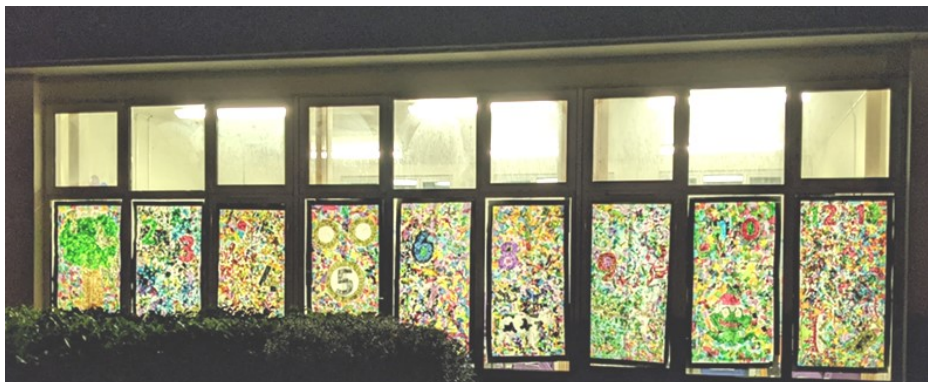

In July, Hainford Primary School was inspected by Ofsted. The inspection confirmed that Hainford VC Primary School continues to be a good school. The inspectors found that pupils at Hainford are very happy and really enjoy their learning and using the school's enquiry approach to find out more about what they are interested in. They recognised that staff make sure that pupils are well cared for, and that those with additional needs have these needs met and that Staff work closely with families to support those who need extra help. There is no bullying, behaviour is good and children learn well. The inspection also concluded that Hainford as a small school benefits from being part of the federation of Nebula Schools.
