CHILDREN'S SAFETY



Parking

Children's University Update.

A message from Mrs Woodhouse:



The next planned Children's University graduation will be in February at the Dragon Hall.

I have to send in our booking on the 6th of January so it is really important that any passports that I haven't updated this school year are handed in promptly at the beginning of term. Please put your passport in the blue basket at the start of the school day.

There are plenty of ways to collect those last few hours to earn the next certificate (see the front of your passport for certificate banding).

You can:

Try some of the winter challenges (see attached sheet).

Go to your local library (half an hour per book read).

Get into any of the Norfolk Museum Services museums for free, including the Castle, Gressenhall, Bridewell and Strangers Hall.

Go to National Trust properties: Blickling, Oxburgh, Felbrigg, Sheringham Park.

Go to any English Heritage Property or visit a Norfolk Wildlife Trust site.

Get your passport stamped at cubs, brownies etc

Going to the Panto? Take your passport for a credit. (If you do forget bring your ticket to school and Mrs Woodhouse will stamp it for you).

Most swimming lesson providers e.g. Norwich Swan, Riverside, are part of the scheme. Only activities undertaken at validated learning destinations count.

If you earn any certificates or awards at clubs that don't belong to CU bring evidence to school and you may be able to earn extra stamps.

School closures in adverse weather



December has been incredibly mild but who knows what January may hold?! Many schools face difficulties as a result of adverse weather, particularly during periods of very low temperature and heavy snow. I am sure that you acknowledge that it is a difficult decision that sometimes has to be made as to whether to temporarily close the school for safety reasons and it is never a decision that is taken lightly.

In some circumstances closure is unavoidable, for example where there would not be enough staff on school sites to ensure pupil safety or the school site cannot be cleared sufficiently to be safe for all who attend the premises. We also have to take into account the travelling conditions and risk assess whether pupils, parents and staff can travel safely to and from school.

Information regarding whether White Woman Lane School is closed and a list of all schools which are closed can be found on the website www.schoolclosures.norfolk.gov.uk. As well as publishing the information on the web, Norfolk County Council will also highlight closures on our Facebook and Twitter channels, using the hashtag #norfolkwinter.

In a situation where there has been snowfall and our school is open, pupils will only be allowed to play outside, at lunch and break times, if they have suitable clothing and footwear i.e. Wellingtons/snow boots and warm clothing and overcoats.

Christmas Fair


Thank you to all who supported this year's Christmas fair. It was a great success and we raised a whopping £1187.44

HEAD UCE

We have had some reports that head lice have returned! The only way they can be controlled is if every parent checks their child's hair. If head lice are present the child should be treated

Head lice are a medical and social problem and are NOT the responsibility of the school.

Head lice are well camouflaged and hide when disturbed by combing. They do not always cause itching particularly when recently arrived on the head. They may also be few in number and a quick inspection is unlikely to detect them.

The recommended method for checking is to use conditioner and a fine toothed comb, checking the comb for lice after each stroke as you work through the hair section by section, so that the whole head is combed through. Rinse out the conditioner and repeat the combing procedure in the wet hair.

If you find lice, treatment should be implemented using lotions obtainable from a pharmacist or by continuing with the wet combing method.
