£8000	Increased access to high quality curriculum physical education through the employment of specialist teachers who work closely with school staff to up-skill and develop professionally	All staff are confident and eager to teach Physical education. Pupil P.E. survey demonstrates enjoyment and participation is 86%
£5000	Employment of a driver to increase access to sporting competition and festivals.	Participation in competition has been sustained, within the SSP, local associations (which are strong) and Nebula Federation. Funding has facilitated release for staff and transport for pupils to compete in cross country, athletics, sportshall athletics, cricket, swimming, football, tag-rugby, korfbal and adapted games. Pupil P.E. survey demonstrates participation in competition and/or festivals is 100% intra-school and 50% inter-school.

£1570	Extra-curricular clubs offered to pupils at no cost. This develops skills, knowledge and understanding and raises self-esteem. Pupils are able to act as role models during curriculum lessons.	Pupil engagement has improved, particularly through structured lunchtimes.
£1575	Extra-curricular dance offered to pupils at no cost, developing flexibility, strength, control, performance skills, musicality and spatial awareness. Pupils are able to act as role models during curriculum lessons. Support for Yr.5 pupils attending residential to access climbing, high ropes, physical team tasks, cycling, zip wire and archery. 10% of the school now play Korfball. COST	PROPOSAL	EXPECTED IMPACT
£5000	Specialist physical education staff will teach pupils and provide staff with professional development, mentoring and resources. <i>Costs are related, pro-rata to employment costs.</i>	Standards in the teaching of physical education will continue to rise and pupils' skill level, participation and enjoyment will increase. The sustainability is self-evident when increasing numbers of staff, including NQTs and SCITT students have the opportunity to work alongside specialists.
£1500	Pupils will continue to compete in SSP arranged competition; local leagues and, increasingly, in Nebula competitions and festivals as the partnership with the Community Sports Foundation develops and a new local venue becomes available. <i>Costs are related to subscriptions; transport; purchase of Nebula trophies; supply costs covering attending staff; hiring of venue and provision of referees/coaches.</i>	We aim to increase the participation of our pupils in regular competition by 50%.
£200	Attendance at all available adapted games events organised through the SSP. <i>Costs are related to transport and staff cover.</i>	Pupils with SEND benefit hugely in participating in adapted sports/games, primarily in areas of self-esteem, enjoyment, courage.
£1 200	Extra-curricular dance to reinforce the curriculum provided through Premier Sport. <i>Costs are related to hiring instructors.</i>	Raising expectation through expert teaching. (This is transferable to the curriculum.)
£3800 £1200	Support for pupils in Yr.6 attending a week's course in sailing, kayaking, canoeing, rafting. Support for pupils in Yr. 5 attending a residential enabling them to access climbing, cycling, high ropes, zip wire, physical team tasks. <i>Costs are related to transport and</i>	Pupils accessing high levels of challenge, personal and skill. Raised self-esteem, aspiration, self-awareness, ability to work as part of a team and self-confidence.

£3 000	Establishing more structured active playtimes by employing an instructor to work with mid-day supervisors, up-skilling them to organise activities raising physical output for all pupils. <i>Costs are related to employing an instructor.</i>	Most pupils will be active, leading to healthier lifestyles and reducing obesity. Pupils will learn to interact more positively, improving social cooperation. (SMSC). By working with mid-day supervisors they will gain confidence and knowledge enabling them to deliver active lunchtimes in their own setting.
£4 250	<i>Maintenance and insurance of minibus. Employment of driver.</i>	Pupils able to travel to a range of activities, competitive and non-competitive.
