£16358	Employment of PE Apprentices This provides support to staff teaching physical education and structured activity at lunchtimes. Apprentices have also been trained to run sensory circuits.	Pupils in lessons will have more individual support, accelerating progress; they will have young role models to influence attitudes; behaviours at lunchtimes will be positive and pupils will be more active. Sensory circuits can be run at various times during the day, meeting the needs of more children.	The engagement of two PE Apprentices enabled sensory circuits to be run; 1:1 provision during lessons if required and small group work to be undertaken in lessons. The apprentices also facilitated more active, structured lunchtimes.
£3200	Pupils will continue to compete in SSP arranged competition; local leagues and, increasingly, in Nebula competitions and festivals as the partnership with the Community Sports Foundation develops. <i>Costs are related to subscriptions; transport; purchase of Nebula trophies; supply costs covering attending staff; hiring of venue and provision of referees/coaches.</i>	We aim to increase the participation of our pupils in regular competition, including cross country. This gives opportunity for competition to a broad range of pupils. It gives access to football, cross country and athletic competition for pupils who would not otherwise be able to compete against other schools.	During the course of the year pupils in year groups 3 – 6 have accessed competitions in multi-sports; rugby; cricket; athletics; cross country. Apart from the physical benefits, children learn to win with humility and lose with grace, learning from the experience. They also begin to understand the enjoyment and responsibilities associated with belonging to a team.
£6172	Support for pupils in Yr.6 attending a non-residential course in kayaking, canoeing and orienteering. <i>Costs are related to transport and accessibility to all pupils which involves supply costs to cover staff.</i>	Pupils accessing high levels of challenge, personal and skill, across new activities. Raised self-esteem, aspiration, self-awareness, ability to work as part of a team and self-confidence.	This experience raised confidence levels for pupils; showing them that new challenge is surmountable. The personal skills experienced directly transferred to successful transfer to High School.

£3000	Maintenance and insurance of minibuses.	Competitions and festivals have restarted. Having transport enables more pupils to access more events. An employed driver enables a greater number of staff, not qualified to drive, to accompany children to fixtures and sporting events thus raising the whole school profile of physical education. It also avoids supply teacher funding.	Pupils across the school have accessed sporting events and competitions. These include Nebula events in a variety of sports; local league football and local association athletics competition at a bespoke, multi-disciplinary athletics venue.

<b>£2600</b>	Maintenance and insurance of minibuses. Employment of a driver.	Having transport enables more pupils to access more events, saving money on coach hire. An employed driver enables a greater number of staff, not qualified to drive, to accompany children to fixtures and sporting events thus raising the whole school profile of physical education. It also avoids supply teacher funding.
<b>£3000</b>	Support for pupils in years 4 and 5 attending residential courses which give pupils access to climbing; high ropes; orienteering; team tasks; cycling. Support for pupils in Yr.6 attending a non-residential course giving pupils access to kayaking, canoeing and sailing. <i>Costs are related to transport and accessibility to all pupils which involves supply costs to cover staff.</i>	Pupils access high levels of personal challenge, learning new skills through activities unavailable to them on the school site. Raised self-esteem, aspiration, self-awareness, ability to work as part of a team and self-confidence are all desired outcomes.
<b>£600</b>	Pupils have access to Nebula competitions and festivals as well as those arranged by the SSP and local leagues. <i>Costs are related to transport; supply costs covering attending staff; hiring of venue and provision of referees/coaches.</i>	We aim to further increase the participation of a broader range of pupils in regular competition, including cross country. It gives access to football, cross country, tag-rugby, cricket and athletic competition for pupils who would not otherwise be able to compete against other schools
<b>£80</b>	Affiliations	This gives the school access to local leagues and associations whereby pupils can compete in local competition against numerous schools.
<b>£14,357</b>	Employment of PE Apprentices This provides support to staff teaching physical education and structured activity at lunchtimes. Apprentices have also been trained to run sensory circuits.	Pupils in lessons will have more individual support, accelerating progress; they will have young role models to influence attitudes; behaviours at lunchtimes will be positive and pupils will be more active. Sensory circuits can be run at various times during the day, meeting the needs of more children.
<b>£155</b>	Dance Taster	All pupils had access to a Hip hop dance taster session which signposted them to local club provision.
